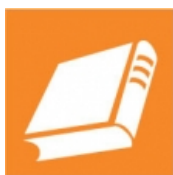

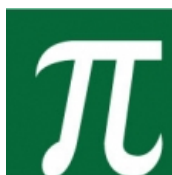

other than the  
question with  
distract from  
associating the  
answer with  
the question.
